If you had captured a terrorist with vital information about an imminent attack, would torture be legitimate to save other people's lives? This ticking-time-bomb-scenario is only one out of many conundrums that counterterrorism strategists regularly discuss; and often enough the general opinion is "yes". But what about the various human rights treaties that the states have signed, what about their commitment to international bodies that were designed to prevent such inhuman practices? This course addresses these questions by giving a step-by-step introduction to the nexus of counterterrorism and Global Governance, before then looking into detail at the ripple effects of Abu Ghraib, Guantanamo, and other prisons in Iraq and Afghanistan.

This course is designed to promote an enhanced understanding of the interplay between Global Governance and international counterterrorism strategies by introducing students to a variety of theoretical approaches and empirical case studies. The course relies on active classroom discussions and participation, which enables the students to critically evaluate each issue area, while also giving them the chance to practice basic research methods, which are essential for the final essay. Active engagement by the students will therefore be necessary and is expected.

By the end of this course, students will:

- 1) Gain an in-depth knowledge of the theoretical basis of Global Governance and international counterterrorism strategies
- 2) Develop an understanding of the main concepts and terminology
- 3) Understand and independently analyze modern security challenges
- 4) Be able to identify current trends in international relations
- 5) Be able to conduct independent research
