# The Consequences of Student Loan Debt on Later Life Transitions

#### **Description**

Student loan debt has increased dramatically in recent decades. Large debt burdens create new challenges as young adult college graduates leave the university and juggle financial responsibilities, family formation plans, and living situations. Using Baccalaureate and Beyond Longitudinal Study (B&B) data, we analyze the stratification of debt across individual and degree characteristics.

Furthermore, we investigate this association with later transitions: marriage, childbearing, and homeownership. Our findings highlight how student loan debt may contribute to delayed life transitions and the reproduction of inequalities.
