Wednesday, October 17, 2018

14.00-17:30 Dos and don'ts in your project application – An intergenerational exchange

This session aims to bring together senior researchers and advanced PhD fellows and early Postdocs. Dr. Wolter, Prof. Dr. Saalfeld, Prof. Dr. Schindler, and Prof. Dr. Sieberer will talk about their personal experiences in acquiring research funding from various national and international organisations, followed by Q&A.

Ilka Wolter is Head of the Junior Research Group: "Gender roles and competences across the life course" at Leibniz Institute for Educational Trajectories Bamberg (LifBi). After finishing her PhD in Psychology in December 2011, she held a 1-year DFG Research Fellowship at University of Sussex, United Kingdom.

Thomas Saalfeld is Professor of Comparative Politics at the University of Bamberg. He has conducted projects funded by the Fritz Thyssen Stiftung für Wissenschaftsförderung (Parliamentary Voting Behaviour in the German Bundestag), the DFG (ANXIETIES, PATHWAYS) and the British ESRC. His current project "Anxieties of Democracy in Europe and North America" is funded by the DFG in cooperation with the Social Science Research Council (SSRC).

Steffen Schindler is Professor of Sociology with focus on Education and Work in the Life Course. His current projects are funded by the DFG (Alternative routes to Higher Education Eligibility)

as well as, together with Prof. Dr. Corinna Kleinert and others, a project within the DIAL transnational research programme of NORFACE (LIFETRACK). Previously, he has received funding from Fritz Thyssen Stiftung and the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF)

Ulrich Sieberer is Professor for Empirical Political Science at the University of Bamberg. He has received funding from the DFG, Fritz Thyssen Stiftung and the Zukunftskolleg at the University of Konstanz for both short-term and long-term projects. Currently, he manages the project “The politics of policy allocation in Germany”.
