#### Program

This course introduces PhD students to the fundamentals of developing a research design in the Social Sciences. The course will cover the essential steps of designing a research project such as finding and specifying a research question, the role of theory, conceptualization and measurement, and different types of research designs. The main focus will be on how to draw valid causal inferences from different types of empirical data. Practical issues of planning and writing a PhD, publication strategies, and applications for funding will also be discussed.

The course will combine lecture-style elements with open discussion and give students the opportunity to discuss and get feedback on the specific challenges they face in developing their PhD project. At the end of the semester, all students will present and get feedback on the research designs for their dissertations.
