Short Description

The seminar provides an introduction of the general processes, events, and topics of the contemporary political history from the French Revolution to our days. While focusing mainly on European and US history, the seminar aims to include a more global approach that cover case-studies and histories from (post-)colonial areas, the Far East and Latin American history. The seminar is specifically designed to offer a broad understanding of the historical processes that are of interest to students of political science. Students will reach general knowledge on the socio-economic, political and cultural aspects that feature contemporary history.
