Presentation of the assigned readings, i.e., summary, research questions, critical analysis, in-class discussion (30% of the final grade);

Short research paper (8,000 words) on the topics studied in class (70% of the final grade).

Language of the Course: English

#### **Short Description**

The seminar provides a global and transdisciplinary overview of welfare state developments. The first part will focus on the use of methods, theories and interpretations from both history and political sciences. The second part will introduce a general global history of social policies from the early German systems to the post-1989 trends. The third and last part will scrutinise in greater detail a selection of historical case-studies, based on historical documents that entangle international relations, transnational actors, policy transfers. Students will learn general trans-disciplinary methods for the study of social policy, they will reach a general knowledge of the global historical trends of social welfare, and they will get more accustomed to use primary (historical) sources.
