Course Description

The topic of how, for whom, and by what means security can be achieved represents one of the most fundamental questions of social science. International security is therefore a central concern of International Relations (IR). Security, being inherent to human existence, has accordingly always occupied a prominent position in global politics, as few issues carry the same potential for both conflict and cooperation. The sub-field of IR that focuses on security issues is now commonly known as Security Studies.

Security permeates our lives, undoubtedly carrying significant political implications. But what exactly is security? While it remains 'essentially contested', i.e. remaining a subject of ongoing debate in both political and academic circles, most IR scholars tend to agree that it involves the protection of, or the mitigation of threats to, cherished values. While traditionally state-centric and primarily concerned with military security, the field has significantly expanded over the past decades. Today, to the chagrin of some and the delight of others, security encompasses a wide range of issues. This unit aims to provide students with an initial understanding of security policy and some of the issues involved.

Prerequisites

- The instruction and working language of this course is **English**. Therefore, all coursework necessary to pass this seminar must be submitted in English. A proficient level of English is a prerequisite for participation and successful completion.
- Prior participation in the **introductory lecture** (Einführungsvorlesung) and in the corresponding **tutorial** (Proseminar) is recommended.

Assessment

The completion of *both* a presentation *and* a term paper are necessary to pass:

Assessment

Presentation

Each participant will give a presentation of approximately **20 minutes in English**.

Your main objective as a presenter is to provide input to your audience on a given topic. This input will serve as the basis for discussion during the session. Most weeks there will be a presentation question for you to answer, although you may also arrange with the lecturer to work on another question instead. The presentation should be based on the required and assigned presentation readings but should not simply be a summary of them. **Nota bene: The presentation must be handed in before the date it is due.** Failure to do so, unless otherwise agreed with the lecturer, will be a missed presentation, which means a failure of the seminar as a whole.

Term Paper

The essay can be written on any topic covered in the seminar. You may build on your presentation topic, but this is not compulsory. You should discuss the research question(s), hypotheses, structure, and possible literature for your essay with your lecturer.

Please note that you will have to submit your paper electronically using the **VC**. Please upload a **pdf file**. The **submission deadline** is **30/09/2024** (at 23:59 CEST).
