Dear First-Semester Students,

As the current Head of Department, I wish to extend an as warm as possible welcome to all our new students on behalf of my colleagues from the Institute of English and American Studies!

I am giving this short welcome address in English because not all of our new students speak German and I wish to make everyone feel equally and utterly welcome.

Unfortunately, due to the Covid-19 situation, this has to be a virtual video welcome. But rest assured that the University of Bamberg and our department are doing their utmost to make you feel like real students and not just virtual ones!

To alleviate potential fears on your side: Thanks to the combined efforts of staff and students alike, we managed to successfully teach last semester under even worse circumstances, when everything had to be arranged at very short-term notice. We were therefore very positively surprised to see that many classes achieved better average marks than in previous semesters, which we thought of as "normal semesters" until recently.

The good marks may have partly been due to the sad fact that less distraction was available, so students perhaps studied English rather than Bamberg nightlife. Fortunately, the situation is better at the time of this recording than it was in early May, and we very much hope that this will remain true during the winter term. Last semester, I conducted various polls in my English Linguistics Introduction and one predictable result was that many first-semester students felt disconnected from their fellow students.
