<b>Requirements:</b>	<u>Preferably:</u> Introductory course(s) in Econometrics and Microeconomics and/or Advanced courses in Econometrics, Policy Evaluation and/or Applied Empirical Economics
<b>Assessment:</b>	Term paper (80%; 10-15 pages) and presentation (20%, 15 minutes)
<b>ECTS:</b>	6 ECTS points

#### Brief description:

Students will be introduced into topics in gender economics. The main aim of this course is to familiarize students with the literature on gender economics, while equip them with skills that allow them to read, discuss, and critically reflect on an empirical paper that uses micro-econometric techniques. The course will include topics such as:

- Causes and origins of gender inequality
- Gender wage gap, work conditions, female labour force participation
- Discrimination, sexual harassment
- Reproductive rights, women's health

Students will be asked to select one paper. This paper will be the basis for the term paper, that will have two parts:

1. Students will need to summarize and critically reflect on the paper they chose with respect to research question, contribution, identification strategy, data and implications.
2. Students will be asked to develop their own research question based on the paper. The research question should be able to be tested empirically, using publicly available data.

Lastly, students will be asked to present their paper before handing-in for last feedback/comments.

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Students are also free to make own suggestions on a paper of their interest conditioned on the mentioned topics, but need to send this paper in advance in order to find an agreement on the paper (topic, journal).

**Outline & Deadlines:**

1<sup>st</sup> session: Kick-off meeting (Aim & idea of seminar, overview of topics, term paper explanation, Q&A)

2<sup>nd</sup> session: Introduction to topics in Gender Economics

\*Deadline\*: Selection and allocation of papers. In case of own suggestion, earlier deadline will apply to agree on the paper.

\*Deadline\*: Deadline to enroll in course (e- mail including name, matriculation number, study program, current semester and selected paper)

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Preliminary schedule:

3<sup>rd</sup> session: Meeting on how to read, discuss and critically reflect an empirical paper

4<sup>th</sup> session: Meeting on data and identification strategies based on selected paper(s)

5<sup>th</sup> session: Meeting on selective replication of a part of a paper and more data/identification strategies

6<sup>th</sup>/ 7<sup>th</sup> sessions: Individual appointments to discuss paper, problems, questions etc. (depending on the number of students, we will allocate slots via doodle)

8<sup>th</sup> session: Meeting on how to present an empirical paper/your term paper

9<sup>th</sup>/ 10<sup>th</sup> sessions: Presentations by students (depending on the number of students, we will allocate slots via doodle)
